Grows quickly, forming dense impenetrable masses that crowd out native vegetation The dry, dead plant matter is a major fire hazard Maui spends \$200,000/ yr. to control naturalized Cortaderia in native forest.
S E D G E S	FOUNTAIN GRASS Pennisetum setaceum	An ornamental bunchgrass that can grow to 4 feet Green leaves grow in a cylindrical pattern. Flowers grow in a spike that are purple to white in color.	Fuels brush fires. Areas dominated by this plant may suffer hotter and more frequent wildfires. Major concern for the leeward side of the island. Able of outcompete dry for- est plants with numerous seeds that spread by wind but also by humans, vehicles, and animals.
T R E E S	JERUSALEM THORN Parkinsonia aculeata	Tree that can grow up 25 feet, with slender branches up to l in. long. Seed pods are 2-8 inches long and leaves look feathery. Flowers cluster together and are bright yellow.	Desert adapted, so able to survive in drier areas like Leeward Oahu. Crowd out native species. Long thorns make access difficult, where it can easily grow on beaches like Kiawe turning a pleas- urable walk into a night- mare.
V I N E S	CAPE IVY Delairea odorata	Popular ornamental climb- ing vine used in land- scaping. Leaves look like a typi- cal ivy with 5 points. Flowers are small and yellow, clustered to- gether.	A weedy pest in England, California, Oregon, Ha- wai'i, Australia, and New Zealand Able grow almost any where. On Maui and the Big Island it is smothering na- tive forests.

F R O G S	COQUI FROG Eleutherodactylus coqui	Rounded body up to 2 inches long. Color can range from green to brown. Males produce a loud, piercing two-tone call like "Ko-keee."	Coqui calls have become a nuisance for residents and visitors of the Big Island reaching 90 decibels. Lack of predators allow this frog to reproduce without limitations and their voracious appetites threaten native insects and arthropods.
