

WHAT IS IT?

- Fireweed (Senecio madagascariensis), is a fastgrowing daisy-like plant that grows upright and branched, up to 20 inches high.
- Yellow flowers each have 13 petals and look like small daises about the size of a nickel.
- Fireweed is native to Madagascar.
- It is known to contaminate hydroseed and hydromulch-especially from Australia.
- It may also infest hapu'u tree ferns and other plants grown in infested areas.

WHY IS IT A PROBLEM?

- Fireweed is toxic to livestock. When eaten, it causes slow growth, illness, liver malfunction and even in death in severe cases.
- It has already invaded pastures on Maui and the Big Island.
- Each flower can produce 150 seeds, each plant can produce 30,000 seeds per year that spread by wind, hiking boots, vehicles or by animals when moved from nfested to non-infested areas.
