

# DO IT ON YOUR OWN TIME!

Dedicate one of your hikes to look for and remove devil weed. You can do this once a month...or once a year. It's up to you!



## CHOOSE YOUR HIKE

A list of trails is on our website. It includes the last time it was surveyed and if any plants were found on that trail. You can hike any trail on island, even if not on the trail list in links below.



## RECORD YOUR SURVEY

Using the free AllTrails App, you can record your survey, and the locations and number of plants you remove. Share this data with OISC via email or text directly from the app! Send your survey data even if no plants are found:

## REMOVE PLANTS

Continually scan the trail sides for devil weed. If you find plants, pull them out (root and all), crack stem and hang them in a tree to dry out and die. Use AllTrails app to make a waypoint with number of plants removed.

## DEVIL WEED CREW - O'AHU, HAWAII

Over the past 100 years, Devil Weed (*Chromolaena odorata*) introductions have spread to India, Africa, SE Asia and the South Pacific islands. It is now one of the world's worst 100 invasive species! An aggressive invader of disturbed soils and open areas, toxic to livestock, it takes over pastures and farmlands.

First detected on O'ahu in 2011, it has spread beyond existing resources for island-wide eradication. Our goal now is to contain and reduce abundance. Keeping it off trails helps stop long-range introductions to new parts of the island.
